


## *Pentecost ~ Year B*

*1<sup>st</sup> Reading: Acts 2:1-11*

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly a sound came from heaven like the rush of a mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared to them tongues as of fire, distributed and resting on each one of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance. Now there were dwelling in Jerusalem Jews, devout men from every nation under heaven. And at this sound the multitude came together, and they were bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in his own language. And they were amazed and wondered, saying, “Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us in his own native language? Par’tians and Medes and E’lamites and residents of Mesopota’mia, Judea and Cappado’cia, Pontus and Asia, Phryg’ia and Pamphyl’ia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyre’ne, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabians, we hear them telling in our own tongues the mighty works of God.” *Response: Thanks be to God.*

*The Epistle: 1 Corinthians 12:3-7, 12-13*

Therefore I want you to understand that no one speaking by the Spirit of God ever says “Jesus be cursed!” and no one can say “Jesus is Lord” except by the Holy Spirit. Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of service, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of working, but it is the same God who inspires them all in every one. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For by one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and all were made to drink of one Spirit.

*The Gospel: John 20:19-23*

On the evening of that day, the first day of the week, the doors being shut where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said to them, “Peace be with you.” When he had said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples were glad when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, “Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, even so I send you.” And when he had said this, he breathed on them, and said to them, “Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained.”

## Announcements

- ❑ Pentecost, with Christmas and Easter, ranks among the great feasts of Christianity. It commemorates not only the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and Disciples, but also the fruits and effects of that event: the completion of the work of redemption, the fullness of grace for the Church and its children, and the gift of faith for all nations.
- ❑ If you attended Mass last week, you might have noticed that we did not have as many men and boys on the altar as we usually do, (and that we had only one licensed chalice bearer/extraordinary minister of the Eucharist to assist in distributing the Precious Blood). Several of our key servers were out of town, or ill, last week. Therefore, we renew this plea again this week: It's time to recruit more altar servers! We are very blessed to have a small and faithful cadre of men and boys who serve every week, but it is (past) time to get some more helpers. Our servers sometimes wish to sit with their families, and (life being what it is these days) sometimes must work on Sunday afternoons. We want to continue to celebrate Solemn Mass every week (even through the long green summer Sundays) but to accomplish this we need more participants -- if you are willing to serve, please see Acolyte Master, Christopher Shirley after Mass.
- ❑ The month of May is dedicated to Our Blessed Mother. You may have heard your mother or grandmother talk about May crownings; many Catholic parishes still have them. A May crowning is a ceremony in May, a month traditionally dedicated to Mary, in which parishioners (often children) crown a statue of Mary with a wreath of flowers. Catholics began honoring Mary this way in the Middle Ages. By the 19th century, when it became common to assign different Catholic devotions to different months— the Rosary in October, for instance, or the Sacred Heart of Jesus in June— it was only natural to dedicate all of May to Mary. Try putting together a simple May altar in your home this year, with a statue of Mary and a simple vase of fresh flowers—even dandelions or lilacs from your yard, picked by your kids!
